Glossary of Vocabulary

- Viking art—Viking Age Scandinavians almost exclusively made applied art; everyday objects were jazzed up to make them more pleasing to look at
- Viking knot—a symbol of the transition between life and death
- Viking longboat—long, slender boats that the Vikings used to travel on the seas
- Warrior— the ambition to better one's life
- Woven—similar to French-Knitting but is woven by hand around a rod former
